Prior to horse racing I played hockey for St. Francis Xavier University for three years and one year for the University of Cape Breton, graduating from there in 1986. Previous to this, I played 250 games in the Quebec Minor Junior Hockey League and was team captain of the Sherbrooke Beavers in the 1980-81 season. Sport has been the biggest part of my life – harness racing included.

My involvement in harness racing started in 1974 when I purchased a subscription to Harness Horse. I started as a fascinated fan and soon purchased my first race horse along with my brothers in 1976 to race at the Cape Breton Sports Centre.
